Things to Do in the Garden - July



Hosta June (pictured)

Fill in empty spaces in beds with summer bloomers, day lilies, sedums, groundcovers, hostas, ferns, hardy geraniums and other soil covering plants to reduce weeds.

Stake tall-growing flowering plants such as delphiniums and lilies. Stake or cage tomato plants.

Cover blueberry bushes with netting to keep birds from eating the entire crop.

Catch up on weeding and apply compost as needed to nourish the soil.



Mulch to conserve soil moisture.

Make sure gardens get at least an inch of water a week. Early morning is the best time to water to reduce evaporation. Water the soil, rather than leaves to reduce disease and water deeply to encourage root growth.

Newly planted trees and shrubs would appreciate additional water to help them get established.

Candle prune pines and tip prune conifers to encourage dense growth.

Clean the birdbaths and refill with fresh water on a regular basis.

Hummingbirds are hungry. Clean and refill feeders with a mixture of 1 part sugar to 4 parts water. Better yet, plant some of their favorites such as fuchsia, penstemon, hibiscus, honeysuckle and liatris to nourish them.

Observe iris clumps. If overgrown or blooming sparsely, divide a few weeks after they finish blooming.

Need help or advice? Bring in pictures of your garden to the nursery and we'll give you some tips. We can also show you plants with year-round interest to make your garden pop with color, even on a grey day.
