A Rant about Native Plants

In the Great Northwest we are blessed with a great many beautiful native plants. There is a growing interest in landscaping with native plants because of their supposed adaptation to local conditions. I don't claim to be an expert on the subject, but my experience with native plant gardening suggests that some like it in my garden and some don't. What follows is a discussion of some of my successes with natives. As you might expect, I quickly gloss over my failures!

Garden Tasks for May and June (courtesy of OSU and WSU Extension)

- Visit public gardens for fresh ideas.
- Prune lilacs, forsythia, rhododendrons, and azaleas right after blooming.
- If needed, fertilize lightly.
- Rhododendrons, azaleas, pieris, and camellias, kalmias and ericaceous plants like an acid-type fertilizer.
- Others use a general purpose.
- Remove spent bulb seedpods, allowing bulb foliage to mature.
- When soil warms (around Memorial day), plant corn and beans.
- Transplant starts of heat-lovers such as tomatoes, peppers, squash and cucumbers.
- Replant replacement crops as early lettuce, greens, bok choys and spinach mature.



- Mulch the garden with a thin layer of straw or rough compost after soil warms to keep down weeds.
- Check irrigation system for summer.
- Provide an inch of water a week as rains taper off.
